



Voters Overwhelmingly Support Raise the Age Legislation

Voters Disagree with Current Treatment of 17 Year-Olds

"Michigan law requires every 17 year-old arrested for a crime be charged as an adult, without exception. This includes arrests for everything from underage drinking and loitering to the most serious crimes like murder. Do you agree or disagree that every 17 year-old should automatically be prosecuted in the adult criminal justice system?"

This survey was conducted by Marketing Resource Group and commissioned by Michigan Catholic Conference. It sampled 600 likely Michigan general election voters and has a statistical margin of error of +/- 4%. The survey was conducted March 10–13, 2018 with 30% of interviews via cell phone and 70% via landline.


Support for Raise the Age Legislation Greatly Increases with Messaging

"Currently, Michigan is one of only five states left in the country that automatically charges all 17-year-olds as adults. I'm going to read to you some reasons people give to **change** the law to keep **most** 17-year-olds in the juvenile justice system **unless** a judge or prosecutor chooses to charge them as an adult in cases of the most serious crimes. For each item, please tell me if it makes you more likely or less likely to support changing the law to give prosecutors and judges more choice."

Most 17-year-olds should be charged as juveniles unless a judge or prosecutor decides to charge them as an adult based on the seriousness of the crime.	44.8%	26.0%	11.5%	8.2%	6.8%	2.5%	0.2%
Juveniles leaving the adult system are 34 percent more likely to re-offend and escalate to violent behavior than are their peers with similar offenses leaving the juvenile justice system.	36.5%	25.3%	13.5%	13.2%	6.5%	4.8%	0.2%
